VOLUNTEERS: OUR GREATEST RESOURCE

Demonstrating Keizer's pride, spirit, and volunteerism in action, KCL is run by an all-volunteer staff. The friendly person at the circulation desk is a volunteer, programs are coordinated and provided by volunteers, our Library Manager and KCL's Governing Board are volunteers as well!

Over 40 volunteers supported KCL by giving 4,800+ hours of their time. Valued at \$25.43 per hour, by the Independent Sector, KCL received in excess of \$124,400 worth of in-kind support.

Volunteers support KCL by...

- Sorting, cataloging, and shelving donated materials
- Checking media in/out, helping patrons find great reads
- Serving on committees and workgroups, Volunteers develop and run our programs and events and, as "Ambassadors" of the library, they also promote them
- They recruit, screen, train, and mentor new volunteers
- Volunteers reflect the ideas and concerns of the community and therefore bring special awareness to the library's planning and administrative processes

Ways to Support the Library

Keizer Community Library is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, Federal tax identification number 93-1180466. The fair market value of donated items and monetary donations are eligible itemized deductions on your tax return.



We are deeply grateful to donors, at every level, all of whom make it possible for KCL to continue providing the essential services that people in the community count on every day.

On-going donations of books, audio books, music CDs, VHS/DVD movies, jigsaw puzzles, board games, sheet music, and library related media support KCL toward keeping our shelves filled with a variety of materials. Donated items not included in our collection are sold at our annual book sales, which in turn, raises funds for operational costs.

The community also supports KCL by shopping at [Fred Meyer](#) with their Rewards Cards and at [AmazonSmile](#), which is operated by Amazon, with the same products, prices, and shopping features as Amazon.com.

The Oregon Cultural Trust tax credit is a unique way the State funds cultural organizations, like the Library, into perpetuity. To qualify, first make a donation to KCL, then make a matching gift to the [Oregon Cultural Trust](#).

With thanks to Volunteer Grant Writer, Mary Sasaki, KCL also received grants including a \$5,000 grant from Oregon Community Foundation to replace 6 computers (hardware and software) and Salem Cherriots bus passes from United Way of the Mid-Willamette Valley, a value of \$600. Library patrons who need a ride to or from the Library are offered one daily adult bus pass for the patron, plus youth passes for children with the adult patron, as long as the supply lasts.

Library Services

Circulation

With thanks, in great part to donations received from our community, KCL has over 1, 500 items in the collection including recently published and popular novels, graphic novels, inspirational fiction, large print books, and a non-fiction section. We also have audio books on tape and CD, as well as DVD and VHS format movies.



We have young adult books and children's area with books, movies, a computer, and activities. KCL has also been fortunate to make available the *Oregon Battle of the Books* collection for 3rd - 12th grade students.

We also have a growing collection of books in Spanish for adults, young adults, and children.

Books (and More) for Sale

Our annual book sales bring the community together through the love of literature with a collection of paperbacks, hardcovers, and books on tape encompassing all genres. Also included in the sale: music CD's, movie DVD's/VHS, puzzles, and games.



Our two book sales raised over \$5,000 in support of the library.

During the year, overstocked items are also available for purchase in the library.

The Steve Prothero Computer Center

Established in 2013, with thanks to grants from the Collins Foundation and Keizer Rotary Foundation, along with a generous donation by Steve and Marilyn Prothero, the Steve Prothero Computer Center provides free use of four computers stations with Microsoft Word/Excel and internet access. As well as copier/printer access at a nominal fee.



A popular service, with over 3,200 users, the computer stations, available for use by the public on a first-come first-served basis, were used to access emails, create resumes, apply for jobs, search for housing,

academic research, enjoying games and videos. In June, the computer center technology was updated with thanks to a grant from Oregon Community Foundation. Free Wi-Fi (wireless) access is available at all times.

Services for Hearing Impaired and Spanish Speaking Patrons

Volunteers proficient in American Sign Language and Spanish were available to help patrons during identified shifts.



Programs

As a cornerstone of the community, KCL is focused on offering free programs which add additional opportunities for learning as well as entertainment. As an integral component of the library's services, programs aid in expanding our role as an invaluable community resource.

Youth Programs

Building a lifelong love of reading and learning is the goal of the KCL's programs, targeting children from birth through teenage years, encouraging them to explore, learn, and enjoy, our collection includes picture books, chapter books, early readers, young adult novels, as well as audio books and movies.



Our youth area includes a dedicated computer, set up specifically for use by preschoolers up to 5th graders with internet access to educational games and kid-friendly websites.

Stories in the Stacks with Summer

Preschoolers, with their adults, enjoyed an hour of stories, crafts, and music every Thursday morning, with Volunteer Summer Reyes.



Summer's story time children to the magic of books, helping them to know sounds, words and language, and develop early literacy skills. They learned to love the value of books and stories. Sparking their imagination and stimulating their curiosity, story time also helped to develop their brains, social and communication skills.

3rd Thursday Lego Club

To some, Lego is just a toy; the educational benefits of playing with the colorful, multi-faceted bricks aren't always clear. However, there are eight key benefits of creating, configuring and crafting with Lego which have been identified including: promoting fine motor skills, improving creativity, developing communication skills, boosting problem solving and mathematical thinking, to name just a few.



Kids with their grown-ups joined us, each 3rd Thursday of the month, for an hour of Lego play, hosted by Volunteer, Rose Aplington. We provided the Legos, the kids engaged their imaginations. They even entered their work in the Oregon State Fair!

Summer Reading & Book Club

During the summer KCL, along with libraries across the country, celebrated space exploration in their summer reading programs. The slogan "A Universe of Stories" was chosen to inspire toddlers to teens to dream big and create their own stories. Prizes and activities also encouraged participants to read for enjoyment, increase their confidence, and become familiar with a variety of genres.



As part of the Summer Reading program KCL also hosted a children's Book Club. Each participant received 3 free books (to keep) and participated in discussion sessions led by a volunteer facilitator.

With thanks to the generous donation of the Juan Young Trust, the cost of the books were fully covered.

Community Programs

Meet the Author Series

KCL featured local author talks by Jillian Torassa, author of the 3-book series *Rebel Thirds*, *Scorned Seconds*, and *Fallen Firsts* and Kim May author of *The Moonflower*. Our author events are both entertaining and informative as authors share excerpts from their books, explain their writing processes, and answer questions.

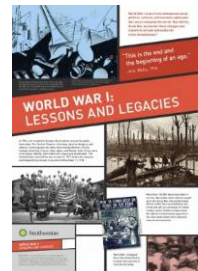


Collections and Exhibits

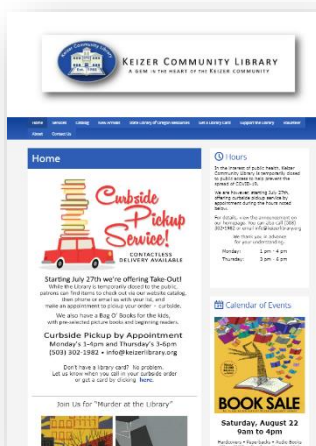

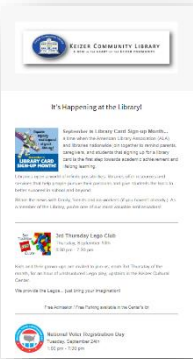
Social Media

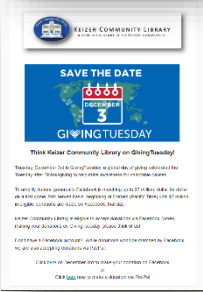

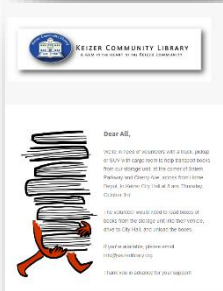
Newsletters

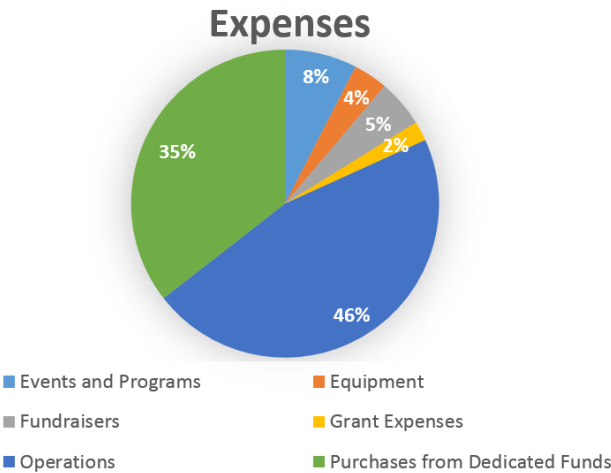
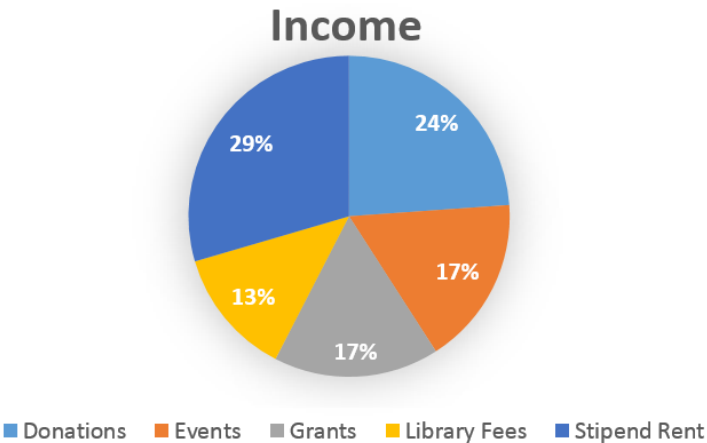
The Year At a Glance
